At Southeast Christian Preschool, we believe each child is a gift from God. We believe children learn through age-appropriate practices modeled at home and school. Parents are the primary educators partnering with Southeast to provide for individual needs and learning styles. We love and nurture young children ages three, four, and five years old. Every day the children participate in a Bible story and learn how much Jesus loves them and invites them

During the year, we helped children develop social/emotional skills, worked on academics, and strengthened physical skills through play and developmental activities. Our staff nurtures and cares for young children. Most of the teachers have been at Southeast for 10 - 18 years. The majority of our staff hold a degree and bring years of experience and their love of Jesus to students and families.

Southeast Christian School provides a Christ-centered education with excellence to students in grades K-8. This year's focus was on establishing long-term, sustainable programs and increasing efficiency and excellence in all areas. At the center of every decision is the success of our teachers and our students. Several projects were started this year to push us toward excellence.

The K-8 school began a multi-year curriculum mapping project to ensure best practices and vertical and horizontal alignment. Teachers worked in teams to assess curriculum alignment to standards, to record resources and benchmarks, and to script a formal curriculum map for the K-8 school.

Our entire staff dedicated countless hours in self-study and preparation for our upcoming reaccreditation visits with the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and AdvancEd. Indicators required collection of evidence and areas





of growth were charted while action plans for growth were put in place.

The focus on differentiation in the classroom continues to grow as we seek to challenge learners at their level of need.

Finally, the technological needs of the school went through a complete systems analysis. Several required updates were made and a plan for sustainment is being crafted. Investment in required infrastructure is designated as a priority for 2019-2020.






HOW DOES SOUTHEAST CHRISTIAN SCHOOL COMPARE TO OTHER SCHOOLS NATIONALLY?

STAR READING END OF YEAR




STAR MATH END OF YEAR





The below percentages reflect students who meet or exceed readiness standards.


SOUTHEAST 6TH GRADE

ART DEPARTMENT

At the start of the year, students learned the basic techniques, elements, and principles of design to help them begin to understand the process of creating art. Students explored a variety of techniques, journaling, planning, and themes in creating artwork. Students also used a variety of material and media from drawing, painting, wirework, sculpture, clay, and much more.

Artsonia, an online gallery, was used to display artwork produced throughout the year. Parents particularly enjoyed this website as they were able to create many novelties using their child's artwork.

Middle school had four style art classes to choose from for electives that included: Art and Tech, Painting, Intro to Art, and Multimedia.

There were several art shows organized throughout the year in conjunction with concerts and the gymnastics program.

Students had several opportunities to participate in art contests, which proved to be an incredible learning tool for our school. One of our highlights included Doodle for Google. It was a contest with the theme "In the future, I hope..." Students from fourth-grade to middle school participated. Elementary students competed in Colorado Kids Create. Students created art representing stories about Colorado's history. We had eight students' artwork published in books! They are available in the school library. Southeast also participated in Colorado Youth Art Flag Design. Students used the Colorado flag as a base and applied the theme "Your Art, Your Story" to create their pieces. One of our artists had their artwork displayed at the state capitol for all of March and at the National Art Conference!

Southeast Christian School was awarded a \$500 scholarship from the Janus Foundation Student Art Buying program to purchase art for display at the school. Three students were selected based on a written paragraph explaining what they would purchase and how it would relate to the culture of our school, as well as a reason they should be chosen to participate. Students were invited to attend







the Cherry Creek Art Festival and purchased art for display in the art classroom.

Students helped to paint the sets for the school musical, "Mary Poppins, Jr." This was an extensive and multiple set project that included the London skyline and a carousel in the park.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Our K-8 Christmas concert, "Are You Ready?" was performed on December 7th. The Middle School

audio/visual, stage management, and promotion. Cast members and students in the middle school art classes created all of the backdrop panels for the show. Members were also given the opportunity to lead daily cast devotions.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

We offered a gymnastics unit for all grade levels.
There was an opportunity for students to participate in special gymnastics teams that included the girls tumbling team, boys exhibition team, and flip team.





Worship Team led corporate worship pieces and presented student-written sermons throughout the concert. Each grade level, kindergarten through fifth, performed two pieces and recited scripture passages

Elementary students hosted a spring concert in April that coincided with Grandparents' Day. The theme of the concert was "Family, Friends, and Community." Students shared how music may be used to build relationships, bring people groups together, and most importantly, tell others about the love of Jesus.

Middle school students presented the Broadway musical, "Mary Poppins, Jr." with four shows in May. Cast members assisted with choreography, staging,

The students worked very hard and were so proud of their accomplishments during our Gymnastics Showcase for parents in March.

Kindergarten through fifth-grade participated in a half-day of Field Day events at Challenger Park. This was a favorite activity for our students at the end of our school year.

EAGLE ATHLETICS

Our goal with middle school athletics was to provide a safe and challenging environment for players of all skill levels to develop their abilities, learn teamwork, and discover the value of camaraderie and community. Coaches sought to demonstrate and instill Christ-like values into players.

VOLLEYBALL: Southeast offered a girls and boys competitive volleyball league for middle school students. The girls' volleyball teams, A and B, finished 9-1 and 3-7 respectively. The boys' volleyball team finished 2-5. Most of our players went on to play high school volleyball at a variety of schools in the area..

BASKETBALL: Southeast offered a girls and boys competitive basketball league for middle school students. Girls basketball had an A and B team and boys basketball had an A and B team. They loved playing for Southeast and representing their school.

SOCCER: Southeast offered, for the first time, a boys competitive soccer team in the fall. The team learned how to play together and proudly represented their school.

CROSS-COUNTRY: Southeast offered a girls and boys cross country team. This team competed in a fall league. The students loved meeting their individual goals.

STEM & TECHNOLOGY

Southeast offered several STEM courses during the year, primarily consisting of Pitsco, Tetrix, and Lego Mindstorm robotics projects. Engineering and science topics were also included. STEM students built a wide variety of robots, structures, designs, and creations.

Our middle school elective technology classes focused primarily on coding but also included website design, Canva graphics, digital literacy, and citizenship. We were also fortunate to have a high-school technology instructor who offered after-school computer clubs.





CHAPEL, SPECIAL SERVICES & EVENTS

Last year, our weekly Chapels were tailored to serve and edify all grade levels. Junior kindergarten through eighth-grade classes participated. The Middle School Worship Team planned and led many of the Chapels. We had several teachers and staff members deliver messages as well. Our theme for the year was "By Faith." Hebrews 11:1-12:3 was the anchor passage for the year.

Tribes were introduced to the school this year as part of Chapel. The six tribes include Tribe of Joseph

(Forgiveness), Tribe of Noah (Righteousness), Tribe of Abraham (Sacrifice), Tribe of Isaac (Humility), Tribe of Moses (Shepherding), and Tribe of Jacob

(Perseverance/Resolve). All students K-5 were assigned a tribe, and middle school students mentored and worked with the elementary grade level included in their tribe. They became Chapel buddies to help model worship and to grow deeper relationships (build community) school-wide.

Middle school students will remain in their tribe until they complete eighth-grade. Tribes became their homeroom family, and each tribe was able to research their namesake and teach a Chapel to educate the school on why this person was known for living by faith.

Several Chapel days were set aside for special services this year

EASTER WEEK CHAPEL: The Middle School Worship Team designed and led a celebratory He is Risen! Easter service that was attended by all junior kindergarten through eighth-grade students and staff.

SPRING NIGHT OF WORSHIP: The Middle School Worship Team designed a service geared towards prayer. Worship Team students sang, recited scripture as a group, read scripture, and led our community in several times of specific prayer.

celebration of Learning: Students presented a variety of projects including science lessons (electrolysis and element flame tests), STEM demonstrations, missions presentations, service learning projects, history research projects and models, and literacy activities to current and prospective parents.

PARKER CHRISTMAS MARKET: The Middle School Worship Team and students from Middle School Art classes participated in the Market on November 30th and December 1st. The Worship Team caroled and led public worship, and our art students facilitated a Christmas Art Project Booth.

COMMISSIONING SERVICE: The Middle School
Worship Team hosted a special chapel during our
Grandparents' and Friends' Day event that focused
on Legacy. Pastor Russ McCracken was our guest
speaker. We also prayed over and commissioned
the Belize Mission Team made up of middle school
students, staff, and parents.

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER: The school hosted a National Day of Prayer (NDP) service. The theme for NDP was "Love One Another" based on John 13:34. Students, staff, and parents met for a time of prayer focusing on this theme. A student from each grade led a dedicated time of prayer on one of the following nine topics: students, families, school leaders, local churches, leaders of the Town of Parker, state leaders, national leaders, President Donald Trump, and the National Prayer written by Ronnie Floyd, President of the National Day of Prayer Task Force.

SERVICE AND MISSIONS





COMPASSION INTERNATIONAL

Preschool students raised money to help support a child in Indonesia, which provided education and food and water for her family.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Southeast Christian School once again partnered with Operation Christmas Child to bring the gospel and joy to children around the world. Each student was given a shoe box to pack full of gifts with their family at home and bring back to school. Several students requested extra boxes! We were able to send over 250 boxes to kids globally!

TOUCHING AFRICA

Students preschool through eighth-grade, raised \$5,283.61 for shoes, water filters, soap, and clothing during our February and March mission focus. Representatives from Touching Africa came to chapels and classrooms to teach us about their work in Africa. Students served by making bracelets and hair bows. Our students also had the opportunity to learn about African culture.

LORD OF THE HARVEST MINISTRIES

Our final mission focus of the school year was to support Lord of the Harvest Ministries. Students donated used backpacks for the 400 children on Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota. Marcos and Ruby Left Hand Bull Sanchez visited Chapel and spoke about the ministry and the children of the Lakota/Sioux Tribe in St. Francis, South Dakota.

MOUNTAINCHILD'S RUN4HOPE

Southeast was a first-time sponsor for the Run4Hope 5K/10K race in June. MountainChild exists to raise awareness, resources, and financial aid for humanitarian work carried out amongst the impoverished children living in the Himalayas.

CU SOUTH DENVER (WILDLIFE EXPERIENCE): On this field trip students studied Colorado history and local wildlife.

DENVER MUSEUM OF NATURE AND SCIENCE: Students studied physical health/the human body, space, and Native American history

2ND GRADE

PLAINS CONSERVATION CENTER FIELD TRIP: On this outdoor field trip, we explored the life of Native Americans who lived in our region.

ANIMAL HABITAT PROJECTS: Students were given the choice of representing an animal and its habitat. They created a poster board to present to the class.

CUTREACH: Students performed Christmas programs for the residents of the Life Care Center in Parker. They also distributed gifts for the residents and visited with them.

WILLIAMSBURG SHOPS: Students prepared and presented a colonial shop of their choice from Williamsburg.

READING BUDDIES: Students partnered with fifthgraders and read with them weekly.

WAX MUSEUM: Students dressed up and presented themselves as wax historical people from colonial times. Other classes came and observed our "wax museum."

REVOLUTIONARY WAR NEWSCASTS: Students learned about various battles of the Revolutionary War, and they created a backdrop and script to act out a live newscast from one of the battles.

3RD GRADE

CASTLEWOOD CANYON FIELD TRIP: Students participated in the "Rock n' Roll" science class. The state park was an excellent science lab to hike around and learn about our state's topography.

FOUR MILE HISTORIC PARK FIELD TRIP: Students participated in "Westward Ho!" This included engaging activity stations that helped our students appreciate the experience of the 700-mile/12 week

pioneer journey across the mid-western and high desert plains.

stem weekly activities: Students participated in a variety of projects which required them to tap into their knowledge and combine science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. Some of the activities included building a boat out of Popsicle sticks, foil, sticky notes, and beads, creating a "house" for the three little pigs using toothpicks and gumdrops, and creating a maze for a Lego man to walk through using Q-tips.

READING BUDDIES: Students met with the first-graders every other week to read and discuss a shared text together. A focus on positive mentorship was emphasized.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

CAMP ELIM: The theme of the week was "Are You Ready?" Daily corporate worship, group activities, and our guest speaker helped prepare hearts as we dug deep into finding out if we were ready for God's plan for our lives. Several students asked Jesus to be their Savior. It was a time of reflection and a whole lot of camp fun!

BELIZE MISSION TRIP: 48 people traveled together to Belize in April. 25 students, 21 parents, and two staff made up our group. We facilitated Sunday School for 125 children preschool through sixth-grade. This included a time of worship, a puppet show, and crafts. We presented devotionals in the classroom for an hour on two weekday mornings. This year the students chose the theme of God's promises and corresponding Bible Characters. Mid-day was devoted to construction projects and home visits. This year we added food delivery to the home visits. Home visits tended to be the thing our students were the most nervous about but were also the most impactful. Some wonderful stories came out of that experience. Construction included framing and siding two

Sunday school classroom attachments to the church building. Afternoons were filled with sports and craft camps for the community. We also invited the community to our talent show and ice cream social. One of the biggest impacts was being able to return to the same community for a third time. We've watched students grow up, seen young people grow into leaders in their community, and learned about the pace of life in Belize. Our relationships have grown deeper and as a result, we feel truly partnered with the community!

EMERGENCY DRILLS: During the course of the year, we practiced a variety of emergency drills, which included: fire, lock down, secure the perimeter, evacuate, and shelter in place.

SAFE2TELL: Considering the numerous security threats any school faces, a state-run information program called Safe2Tell was instituted. This program allows for anonymously reporting any situation or fact believed to be relevant in regards to the safety of a staff member or student. Additional education on bullying was also presented to students.

ACSI EVENTS

Participating in ACSI events builds confidence in the students as they mature in the talents that God has given them. We encourage students to do their best as they represent the Lord and Southeast Christian School.

MATH BY MAIL was an in-house event for 36 of our third though eighth-graders. There were two testing categories: reasoning and computation. Those who scored in the top 20% out of 38 schools and 1,047 students were invited to participate in the Math Olympics held at Colorado Springs Christian School. Congratulations to five of our students who qualified to participate in the Math Olympics.

THE SPELLING BEE was held at Denver Christian School in January. 16 students from first through eighthgrade participated in the Bee, and one of our students qualified for the final round.

THE SPEECH MEET was offered to all students first through eighth-grade. The students chose from a variety of selections to memorize and present before a panel of judges. Those who qualified continued on to the Speech Meet. This year, Southeast sent 30 students to Front Range Christian School where they each received individual ribbons for competing in the meet.
